The RAMPED program, through strategic planning and coordinated efforts is designed to make school mental health providers accessible to students and staff across five districts and twelve campuses. The RAMPED team is comprised of trained school educator mental health professionals who have partnered to train, mentor, and supervise school-based mental health services providers from various universities to expand the number of these professionals available to address the shortages of schoolbased mental health

services providers in high-need schools in rural and low-income school districts. The RAMPED program has a robust management plan that includes the mechanisms necessary to ensure high-quality products and services are provided. Through this unique experience, the RAMPED program will provide increased access to school mental health services for 2,806 students and families across the five districts, therefore limiting or removing potential health disparities and barriers to quality mental health and wellness.

THE FIVE DISTINCT PHASES OF THE RAMPED PROGRAM

- (1) Filling the Gap Involves recruiting school mental health professionals seeking to complete their fieldwork in a RAMPED school.
- (2) Growing Your Own Will open the RAMPED program to local area school staff who wish to re-specialize by securing a credential as a school mental health professional.
- (3) Community Re-Specialization RAMPED will accept referrals from community members willing to re-specialize and obtain a school mental health credential.
- (4) Building Capacity Ensuring school mental health professionals are always available in the community to fill open positions.
- (5) Sustaining the Program Results of the RAMPED program's rigorous evaluation will be utilized to help secure local and state funding to sustain those components of the program that are deemed effective.
